



#### Date of Entry

The online entry system opens July 1, 2025. The standard entry rate period closes September 1, 2025 at 11:59 p.m. (CDT). Late online entries may be submitted through breed show check in at the show. Late fees will apply beginning September 2, 2025 through the show. NO PAPER or EMAILED ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

#### **Entry Application**

All entries are subject to approval by World Dairy Expo. Exhibitors will receive written notice of acceptance or denial. There is no animal limit per class per exhibitor, unless otherwise stated by national breed association junior rules. All animals <u>must</u> have an official USDA AIN (840) or Canadian CCIA (124) number listed at time of entry submission. <u>Pending identification will not be accepted.</u> (See page 10 for acceptable forms of identification.)

#### **Online Entry Required**

This premium book and all enclosed forms are available at <a href="worlddairyexpo.com">worlddairyexpo.com</a>. You MUST utilize the online entry system and pay by credit card, including all applicable service fees, by 11:59 p.m. (CDT) on September 1, 2025. Late entries will continue to be accepted online until 5:00 p.m. CDT the day prior to each breed's exhibitor meeting at the show; late fees apply. Animal Registration Papers may be uploaded or web-linked to the animal entry. Group class entries must be made online.

#### **Entry Fee Refund Policy**

Entry Fee Refund Policy: No refunds of entry fees will be issued for any reason, including entries made for animals that do not show.

Please note that by submitting electronic entry with payment: entrants, authorized agents and representatives including, but not limited to, all persons handling, caring for or fitting the animal (such as string staff and fitters), have agreed to follow the rules of World Dairy Expo and applicable laws. It is possible for violators of applicable laws to be subject to citation, arrest, or other enforcement action for each infraction. Penalties for violating World Dairy Expo rules, pending severity, can include but are not limited to loss of stalling location, monetary fine, forfeiture of premiums and/or banishment from the Show. Additionally, individuals engaging in conduct that results in damage, injury or death could also be subject to very substantial damages in a civil lawsuit. Furthermore, any sanctioned owner, exhibitor or employee (including string staff) could lose the privilege to exhibit at World Dairy Expo or face other penalties. Please be advised that the Dane County Sheriff's Office will be utilizing undercover officers to assist with enforcing World Dairy Expo's policies.

#### **Exhibitor Season Admission Tickets**

Admission is required Tuesday. September 30 - Friday. October 3. 2025.

Dairy Cattle Exhibitors may purchase up to 4 Season Tickets at the reduced rate of \$30 each when purchased by Sept. 15, 2025, 11:59 p.m. CDT. See the Dairy Cattle Show-Exhibitor Dashboard online to order.

Ticket prices through Sept. 29: Daily \$15 | Season \$40 each, online only.

Ticket prices Sept. 30-Oct. 3: Daily \$20 | Season \$50, available online or at gate.

No exhibitor admission tickets will be mailed. No refunds, for any reason. Transaction fees and applicable sales tax will be added to the total ticket transaction amount at the time of purchase.

#### **ExpoTV Subscription**

ExpoTV subscriptions will be available for purchase starting July 1, 2025. The fee is \$20 per subscriber. See the Dairy Cattle Show-Exhibitor Dashboard online to order. Subscribers have access to live streams of all dairy cattle shows as well as on-demand viewing of both the dairy cattle shows and educational programming starting at noon on September 28 through end of day on December 31, 2025. All 2025 footage will be archived and available to view free of charge on YouTube as of January 1, 2026.

#### **Dual Registered Animals**

Dual registered animals are eligible to enter and exhibit in only **ONE** breed show. If an animal is exhibited in the International Junior Holstein Show, the only other show she may enter and exhibit in is the International Holstein Show. Likewise, if an animal is shown in the International Red & White Show, it may **NOT** be shown in the International Holstein Show or International Junior Holstein Show.

International Junior Holstein Show entry information can be found on page 73. Unless otherwise noted, all show rules and regulations apply.

#### **Production Records**

World Dairy Expo is a "Production Recognized" show. To be eligible for production awards, official DHI or DHIR records of **305-days or less** must be included with entries for cows ages Senior Two-Year-Old (Winter and Fall) and older. 305-day records will be printed in the show Cattle Log. A record up to 365-days will also be printed (if provided), only if a 305-day record is provided for the same lactation. All records must be actual; no mature equivalent or average age records will be accepted. Exhibitors may provide the Herd Code and Control Number for each animal at time of entry or must provide official proof of the actual 305-day record to the Breed Superintendent at cattle check-in for verification and to be considered for production awards.

Only animals that place in the top 75% of the class will be considered for Production Awards. Determination of the top 75% will be made by the Breed Superintendent. Their decision will be final. *Official DHI or DHIR records MUST be provided in order to enter production classes.* Production award rosette are presented by <u>Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding</u>, Bowie, MD.

## - On-Site Rules & Information -

#### Release of Liability

Every precaution will be taken to properly protect animals and exhibits in this show. The management, however, will not be liable for the safety of animals, exhibits, exhibitors or their employees, or for losses sustained because of robbery, damage by fire, accident or any other cause. Exhibitors wishing to insure their livestock or exhibits must do so at their own expense.

#### Stalling

The Breed Superintendents use the Stalling Request Form to stall your string. Please complete the enclosed stalling form (also available online) with as much information as possible and by September 10. From September 11-23, please call our stalling hot line at 608-224-6455 ext 4 to confirm stalling information or if the number of animals in your string changes. No Pavilion locations or stall information will be given over the phone; stalls will be assigned only when you arrive on grounds. Stall space will be assigned for animals on grounds, not animals entered. 24-hour feed and bedding storage is allowed in the Pavilions and Cattle Housing Tents. Exhibitors with a minimum of six (6) head will be allowed access to one clipping space. Consideration on stalling space requests will be given only if the Stalling Request Form is adequately completed.

#### **Definition of a String and String Manager**

A string is defined as: By consent of all owners, animals are interspersed within a row that must share tack, feed, bedding, clipping space and crew. A String Manager is defined as: the main contact who is responsible for the care of the animals within the string.

#### **Reception of Animals**

Exhibitors from all U.S. states and Canadian provinces wishing to arrive Wednesday, September 24 beginning at 10 a.m. CST may do so with written permission from the Dairy Systems Manager and must have a completed Early Arrival Request Form (enclosed) on file with World Dairy Expo. All early arrival requests must be received by September 10. There are no geographic restrictions on early arrivals. Refer to the table below for designated arrival times.

#### Cattle must be in place by noon the day following placement of tack and bedding.

All animals must be on-grounds by noon (CDT) on Saturday, September 27. You may utilize the onsite stalling number (608-267-3924) to report any emergency delays in arrival. Penalties for not observing these rules can include, but are not limited to losing preferred locations and/or potentially not being able to serve in an official capacity with World Dairy Expo. **Exhibitors arriving on grounds** Wednesday, September 24 without written permission will be subject to a rules violation.

#### Animal Identification & Health Paper Check-In

Health papers of ALL animals will be checked as animals arrive on grounds. Below are details to expedite your arrival to World Dairy Expo.

- · Health papers MUST accompany animals to verify health test and veterinary inspection requirements.
- Health papers are required to list the full 15-digit animal-attached AIN/CCIA identification.
  - A Canadian Cattle Identification Agency (CCIA) RFID tag 15-digit number starting with 124 (example: 124000299999999)
  - A USDA 840 Animal Identification Number (AIN) RFID or visual tag
  - 15-digit number starting with 840 (example: 840003007863940) 840 tags applied after November 15, 2024 must be electronic (RFID) AND Visually readable. Cattle with USDA 840 visual only tags applied before this date may continue to use that tag for the rest of that animal's life.
- · All animals must enter through the Alliant Energy Center Main Gate at Rimrock Road, and stop at the Arena Building to begin health check-in and receive stalling locations. This is the only gate animals may enter through from Wednesday, September 24 through Saturday, September 27.
- Print and bring copies of health papers and Influenza A tests for ALL animals on your trailer.
- A check-in team will escort you as close to your stalling location as possible.
- Animals will be checked against health papers as they come off the trailer. USDA and Wisconsin DATCP veterinarians and World Dairy Expo approved staff, including UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine students, will be part of these check-in teams.

#### **Cattle Check-In to Breed Shows**

Breed Superintendents and their crews will be in the Pavilions and Cattle Tents verifying class entries, original registration paper and/or electronic registration certificates and other official records, including declaration of syndicate members. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to notify the Breed Superintendent of the location of their animals and to make certain the animals are checked into their breed show. All animals must be checked in by 5 p.m. the evening before the start of the breed's show. If an animal has not been checked-in, notify the Dairy Cattle Show Office (upper level of the Coliseum) at (608) 267-3924.

U.S. exhibitors needing USDA AIN tags, <u>Datamars Livestock</u>, Temple, TX, is providing up to ten (10) 840-series RFID tag sets per exhibitor. A premise ID is required. Contact Datamars to obtain your tags, learn more:

#### Release of Cattle

Dairy cattle are released beginning at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, October 3. All trucks and trailers will be held in Quann Park until animal release. No cattle trucks and trailers or animal traffic will be allowed into the Rusk lot (south of Pavilions) during egress or in front/east of Pavilion 1 at any time.

No exhibit shall be dismantled or equipment/tack removed from its assigned space until the conclusion of the cow Supreme Ceremony. Pavilions will remain open on Saturday for those wishing to stay overnight. All tack, animals and equipment must be removed from the Pavilions, tent and grounds by Noon, Saturday, October 4. Animals may be released early by written permission from the Breed Superintendent or veterinary staff. Exhibitors shall comply with all decisions of the Show Management and/or Superintendents regarding housing of the cattle or moving animals on the show grounds.

The penalty for early departure, without permission from Show Management is forfeiture of premiums. The exhibitor will be barred from exhibiting at World Dairy Expo in the future unless permission is granted by the On-Site Rules Committee. Any equipment or vehicles remaining after October 4 are subject to removal, disposal or towed at owner's expense.

#### Early Release Cattle Eligibility

Show Early Release: Cattle entries approved for early release from the Junior Holstein (Sunday) and Guernsey (Sunday or Monday) Shows are eligible to depart from 6:00 p.m. - midnight. After that time, these cattle must remain on grounds through Friday, 5:30 p.m. Application is with your animal entry, check the box for Early Release.

Influenza A Test Requirements for Early Release:

- 1. If your travel and exhibition time at World Dairy Expo meets one of these two requirements: a) If your travel and exhibition time will exceed the USDA order which states that, "animals may travel to their home herd using the same negative test result [that they came in on], provided the exhibition, show or sale does not exceed 10 days of length and a new test would be required. b) If your travel and exhibition time will exceed your local state or provincial order of a shorter length of time (ex: 7 days) on the same negative test and a new test would be required.
- 2. If you have lactating dairy cattle (no heifer-only groups are eligible for early release).
- 3. If your non-lactating cattle are traveling with lactating cattle that would be outside of travel time
- granted by the USDA or state, they are eligible to leave upon approval.

   You must have at least one lactating animal that arrives on-grounds at World Dairy Expo, to be eligible.

Verification of state destination testing and travel time is the burden of the dairy cattle exhibitor.

Application for Influenza A Early Release will be a Google Survey link in the Exhibitor Dashboard.

Confirmation: Exhibitors will receive an Early Release confirmation email of approval or denial from World Dairy Expo. Exhibitors must adhere to the clean-up requirements for early release, including but not limited to: removal of signage, cage/fans, supplies, and feed & tack; trash and debris placed in trash containers, aisle swept, and payments issued for any vet and feed bills.

#### **On-Site Rules Committee**

In the event an on-site rules violation allegedly takes place, it will be reviewed by the On-Site Rules Committee. The Committee includes the World Dairy Expo Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Committee Chair, Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Committee Vice Chair, World Dairy Expo General Manager and the Overall Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent. Three (3) of the four (4) must be present to make a decision on an alleged rules violation. The ruling will then be communicated to the involved party(ies). Written communication/documentation will be distributed to the party(ies) and retained in the World Dairy Expo files. Consequences are dependent on severity of the rules violation.

#### **Grounds & Electrical Safety**

Alliant Energy Center of Dane County (AEC) is the owner of the grounds. AEC policies, local, state and federal laws must be followed at all times while on AEC grounds. The City of Madison Fire Department has jurisdiction over the grounds with respect to fire code. The following items are indicated as concerns for the event in regards to exhibitors: All grills must be at least 25' from the Pavilions, tents or hay storage. Exhibitors may use only propane grills. Charcoal grills are prohibited on grounds. Any sort of grilling or open flame within the Pavilions and tents is strictly prohibited. Storage of propane within any building or tent is strictly prohibited.

10'x10' pop-up tents (when space is purchased with entries) are allowed, with tent tops attached. Tents are required to have an operable 2A-10B:C fire extinguisher positioned immediately outside of the tent. City of Madison Fire Inspectors and AEC Staff have the authority to look in any pop-up tent, at any time. City of Madison Fire Inspectors and AEC Staff will make an attempt to check with string personnel prior to tent entry, however, if deemed necessary, they will proceed without doing so.

Exhibitors are required to plug any appliances (blowers, clippers, crock pots, etc.) into a GFCI power strip/outlet. Heavy duty 3-wire electrical cords must be used and under no circumstances can electrical cords touch straw, hay, metal beams or rafters. Portable generators are not allowed on grounds.

AEC and the City of Madison have set the following electrical requirements:

- No more than three (3) cooking appliances per power strip. Common, allowable items are crock pots, microwaves, coffee pots and one (1) refrigerator. No hot plates or griddles are allowed inside a building or tent.
- Refrigerator must be plugged directly into a power source.
- A single, 12-gauge extension cord may be used to connect an appliance to a power source.
- All electrical cords must be elevated above the ground. Running cords on top of stalling panel is best option.

Fire lanes of 20-feet wide around the Pavilions and Cattle Tents must be kept open. Exhibitors are asked to comply with all "No Parking" and other posted safety regulations. Citations will be issued to anyone parked in a "No Parking" area or caught smoking in any Pavilion, tent or building. Wisconsin Legislature 101.123 states smoking is prohibited in any Pavilion, tent or indoor area. Strict adherence to these rules is required.

Feed and Bedding Storage

Per the City of Madison Fire Marshal: One-day feed and bedding storage will be accommodated within a stalling location. (See definition of String on pg 8.) External Pavilion storage is limited and available on a first-come basis. Materials MUST NOT block doorways/exits. All Pavilion North and South interior walkways must maintain a clear four (4') feet wide continuous aisle. Feed and bedding stored around the Cattle Tent must be kept at least ten (10') feet from the tent. Additional feed and bedding should be stored in trailers in Quann Park or off-site. Bales of straw and/or hay may be stacked to a height of four (4) feet within Pavilions and Tent. Exterior/Under overhang bale storage may stack to a height of eight (8) feet. Round and large square bales of hay/straw must be kept tidy for the duration of the show. Hay/straw/bedding must be stored at least five (5) feet away from appliance or power sources. Hay/straw/bedding must take up no more than 25% of the exhibitor's floor space, and may never exceed an area larger than 10'x10'. Violation of grounds safety and cleanliness regulations are considered rules violations and are subject to review by the On-Site Rules Committee.

#### **Feed Vendor**

Show Management reserves the right to subcontract feed and bedding vendors. <u>Anyone not contracted through World Dairy Expo, that is found to be selling feed or bedding on World Dairy Expo grounds will be subject to all penalties enforceable.</u>

The official feed vendor, JRS Enterprises, Inc., will have headquarters at World Dairy Expo. The feed vendor will be on grounds beginning Wednesday, September 24. No bedding is provided by World Dairy Expo; straw and shavings are available for purchase. Bedding with any material other than straw and/or shavings is not permitted.

**Feed and Bedding Delivery Times** 

WDE's official feed vendor will have access to the Pavilions and Cattle Tents as needed throughout the Show. Vehicle delivery times for exhibitors must be completed between 6 p.m. – 8 a.m. daily.

#### Feed and Bedding Delivery Courtesy Carts

World Dairy Expo will provide high capacity, non-motorized platform carts for exhibitor use to aid with delivery of feed supply <u>within</u> the Pavilions and Cattle Tents. All carts must be returned to their designated storage locations. These courtesy carts are provided for the benefit of exhibitors. If carts are not returned, they will not be replaced by Expo.

#### Official Veterinary Service

World Dairy Expo's official veterinarians will be on grounds the duration of the event and will be available to exhibitors for treatment of animals.

Veterinary service regular hours will be 7 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Emergency response hours are 5 p.m. - 7 a.m.

Reasonable charges will be made for veterinary services, additional fees may be charged for calls during the emergency response hours. In case of emergency, call the vet phone number posted outside the vet office. You may also leave a note on the veterinary identified vehicle parked at the east end of Pavilion 2.

#### **Unsettled Bills**

All bills with the official World Dairy Expo veterinarian and feed vendor must be settled before leaving the show grounds. All unsettled bills with the official veterinarian, feed vendor AND World Dairy Expo are subject to late fees. Premium monies will be held until the past due amount is paid in full. After December 15th, premium monies will be forfeited, additional late fees assessed. Exhibitors with unpaid bills will be barred from exhibiting and/or selling cattle at the following year's World Dairy Expo until the outstanding balance has been paid in full. This includes members of partnerships.

#### **Sharps**

All sharps MUST be disposed of in sharps containers. Disposal of sharps in garbage cans, recycle bins and manure bins is strictly prohibited. Sharps containers are placed at the overhead doors of the New Holland Pavilions and in the cattle housing tents. A limited supply of containers is available to exhibitors at the Milking Parlor.

#### **Cattle Movement**

Cattle are not allowed on the Plaza between Pavilion 1 and The Tanbark/Arena Building, and shall not be in the center aisle of the Pavilions.

#### **Cattle Washing**

Cattle washing must be done within designated wash racks. These are drained to sanitary sewers to comply with Dane County and City of Madison health requirements. Surface runoff of soaps, manure, etc., beyond the washracks must be prevented.

#### **Animal Care and Cleanliness**

Exhibitors are required to give the necessary personal attention to their livestock and equipment. Every exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal exhibited, and for its description as given in the Cattle Log, and shall indemnify the show and hold it harmless from any loss, cost or expense caused by an exhibit.

Painting of hooves is prohibited on any concrete surface inside the Pavilions and under the overhangs. Painting is allowed on the blacktop surfaces outside the buildings with the use of a board, rubber mat, feed bag etc. under the hooves.

The Wisconsin DATCP urges that every precaution be taken on the part of exhibitors to use individual utensils in caring for animals. **Common watering troughs are forbidden**. Each exhibitor shall provide water buckets to be used for his/her stock only.

The Department also urges all exhibitors to thoroughly clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport their animals to and from World Dairy Expo. All animals should have room enough to be fed and watered in transit, and should not be unloaded or left in a stockyard during transit or at the time of loading or unloading.

#### Milking Equipment & Milking Parlor

State of Wisconsin sanitary regulations stipulate that World Dairy Expo is not permitted to sell any milk for public consumption. Exhibitors may use their own milking equipment or the BouMatic milking parlor, located in Pavilion 2. Parlor hours of operation will be posted at the show.

#### Milk Disposal

Milk collected in the string must be emptied into milk receiving stations, placed around Pavilions 1 and 2 and the Cattle Tents. Routine milk collection runs will be done by UW student workers throughout the week of the show. At the direction of the Madison Metropolitan Sewage District (MMSD), exhibitors are not allowed to dispense raw milk or other biological materials into any floor drains or release outlets on the Alliant Energy Center campus. Dispensing of such material is a direct violation of MMSD ordinance 84-001, Article V. Violation of this ordinance may result in financial penalties as allowed by State, County and local statues. If milk receiving stations need emptying, please notify the Dairy Cattle Show Office (608-267-3924). Milk buckets will NOT be provided.

Milk may **NOT** be dumped in manure piles, Pavilion drains, or anywhere on the Alliant Energy Center grounds.

#### Manure and Trash Disposal

We ask for all exhibitors' cooperation in keeping the Pavilions and Cattle Tents as clean as possible. If your animal drops manure in the aisles, please clean it up immediately. Manure must be removed by the exhibitor and taken to the specified locations outside of the Pavilions or Cattle Tents for the duration of the show. Exhibitors must provide their own manure carts to move waste to specified manure locations. String, cans, bottles, and other trash must be deposited in provided trash

**containers.** Dane County compost regulations and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources stipulate only bedding materials and manure are to be hauled to the compost site. Additionally, Expo's manure contractor charges additional fees for trash collection of the animal packs at move out. Expo's manure may be applied to farm fields or regenerated to compost.

#### **Pavilion and Cattle Tent Displays**

Exhibitors are encouraged to display animal's official pedigree and production records on signs above their cattle. Full sheets of solid paneling in front of the animals will not be allowed to ensure adequate air flow and ventilation. Solid displays in front of cattle are limited to 30" from top to bottom. Dairy cattle exhibitor displays on center aisle panels are limited to 10' x 7' x 24". Displays on north and south wall panels are limited to 10' x 7' and must not protrude from the panel into the walkway. Alteration of any portion of any stalling panels is strictly prohibited. Drilling, taping, stapling, nailing, welding, screwing and adhesives are prohibited from use on any livestock stalling or building surface. Altering or damage to any County-owned property will require either repair at the exhibitor's expense or replacement with fees assessed to the exhibitor.

#### **Promotion and Exhibitor Signage**

Exhibitor signage must be hung within the assigned stalling area and may not be hung or displayed on the outside or entryway of buildings. Signage and promotion are limited to: animals owned and their genetics, the farm/owner and/or dairy show cattle services (services are defined as: fitting, boarding, trucking, and/or sale services). Forms of promotion include, but are not limited to, signage, hand-outs, flyers, videos and giveaways.

#### **Alcohol Policy**

World Dairy Expo strives to comply with all existing laws that govern our event, therefore, any consumption of alcoholic beverages at World Dairy Expo is required to be done responsibly and legally. Exhibitors are responsible for, and are expected to, eliminate alcohol consumption by minors on grounds. Self-service is prohibited and carrying-in of alcohol at World Dairy Expo is strongly discouraged. The legal age of alcohol consumption in Wisconsin is 21 years old. Violators of the laws will be subject to citations per infraction. World Dairy Expo reserves the right to have any individuals violating the laws removed from the Alliant Energy Center grounds. World Dairy Expo assumes no liability for any damages, injuries or death occurring as a result of any individual's consumption of alcohol. Please ensure there is no self-service of alcohol in your display area. If you would like to have alcohol or any other food or beverage served at your display, please contact Sodexo Live! at 608-661-0525 who is contracted by the Alliant Energy Center to provide all food and beverages (including alcoholic) on the AEC campus.

#### **Golf Carts and Other Motorized Vehicles**

Other than carts registered for use by Expo staff and volunteers, **golf carts are not permitted on grounds**. Four-wheelers, mopeds, unauthorized gators and **unauthorized skid loaders** are **not** permitted on grounds at any time. Single person motorized scooters are allowed with a medical release and must be registered with the World Dairy Expo administration office.

#### **Dogs On Grounds**

No dogs or other domesticated animals are permitted in AEC facilities. Service dogs are permitted provided they remain on a leash. This includes but is not limited to a guide dog, signal dog, and/ or service dogs "in training," but does not include dogs that only provide emotional support or companionship. Any individuals with unauthorized animals may be subject to fines and the animal will be required to be removed from the facility.

#### **Attention Out-Of-State Exhibitors**

Wisconsin Statutes require that all trucks and tractors 26,000 pounds and up obtain State of WI Reciprocity Permits or Plates. Permits are available from the Wisconsin Motor Carrier Services, Madison, WI (608-266-9900).

#### NO LIVE BROADCASTING BY ATTENDEES or EXHIBITORS.

You agree that you will not live broadcast or livestream any recording clips over 3 minutes in length of the World Dairy Expo (including any shows or events), including without limitation, through YouTube, Facebook, X, Instagram, or any other communication channel or social media platform. You may take pictures and video recordings at World Dairy Expo solely for your own personal use.

#### **Cattle Show Farm Affiliate Program**

The Cattle Show Farm Affiliate Program allows for affiliated companies or businesses under the same ownership as an exhibited animal's registered owner that is housed at World Dairy Expo, to be on-site, for a fee, to hang promotional signage in the designated stalling area noted below. An affiliate company or business is marketing products such as, but not limited to cattle panels/gates, genetics, feed vendors, dairy-related products or feed additives, etc. A full product category list can be found on the Cattle Show Affiliate application. \*The following are NOT REQUIRED to complete a Cattle Show Affiliate application: Promotion of animals in the string, boarding facilities, trucking or exhibitor farms.

This program does not, in any way, alter World Dairy Expo's "No Subletting" restriction. The string manager, noted on the application, is responsible for all Cattle Show Affiliate promotion in the string and must be prepared to show proof of business relationship with the affiliated company upon request.

#### **Show Service Provider Program**

World Dairy Expo's Show Service Provider Program (SSP) is an opportunity for dairy show service providers to be on-site, for a fee, offering dairy show services to dairy cattle exhibitors. World Dairy Expo dairy show service providers are providing services such as, but not limited to, on-site hoof trimming, MagnaWave©, chiropractic services, tail services, etc.

#### **Dairy Cattle Photography Service Provider Program**

World Dairy Expo's Dairy Cattle Photography Service Provider Program is an opportunity for dairy cattle photographers to be on-site, for a fee, offering dairy cattle exhibitors professional photography and videography while on grounds at World Dairy Expo. These individuals are photographers who are "charging to capture footage or images." Approved defined areas are: dairy cattle housing, walking path to the Coliseum, willows, and Coliseum seats. (ONLY WDE OFFICIAL PHOTOGRAPHERS ARE ALLOWED ON THE COLORED SHAVINGS FOR THE DURATION OF THE SHOW.) Anyone unwilling to comply will be asked to leave the grounds, or at a minimum, return their equipment to their vehicle. Photographers may not use drones at the Alliant Energy Center. Video footage of the showring must not interfere with ExpoTV copyrights (No video clips over 3 minutes in length in the showring).

World Dairy Expo reserves the right to request a copy of the Certificate of Insurance for any Show Service Provider.

## - Dairy Cattle Show Rules & Regulations -

Show Management intends to follow suggestions of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association in conducting the show, designating the classes and awarding premiums. Only Purebred Dairy Cattle Association recognized breeds are allowed to exhibit at World Dairy Expo. The following rules and regulations apply unless an exception is given in the individual breed sections that follow.

#### Interpreting & Amending Rules

Show Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules, if deemed necessary. Show Management also reserves the final and absolute right to interpret the rules and regulations of the show, and will arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or in connection with the show.

#### **Dress Code & Show Harnesses**

All exhibitors are required to wear white trousers and an official harness when leading animals in the Showring. No hats or caps will be allowed. **Shirts with farm names or agricultural logos are prohibited.** Enforcement is strict and violators will not be permitted to enter the ring. Official World Dairy Expo Showring Harness is a front-and-back show card harness which holds a 5" x 7" card.

Any person leading an animal at World Dairy Expo must be at least nine (9) years of age as of the breed show day at World Dairy Expo. No child under the age of nine (9) may accompany an adult in the Showring. Only one person is allowed at the halter of an animal.

#### **Junior Show Shirts**

All junior exhibitors are required to wear a **World Dairy Expo provided Junior Show shirt and white pants** while exhibiting. Provide adult shirt size when making entries. Shirts may be picked up at the Dairy Cattle Show Office, upper level of the Coliseum or at the Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Appreciation Ice Cream Social in the Tanbark, Saturday at 2:00 p.m.

#### Showing Animals & Availability For Judging Contests

Exhibitors and Sale Managers shall make their animals available for participation in all judging contests as directed by Show Management. All contest organizers will confirm with the exhibitor the Sunday and Tuesday judging schedules. National Dairy Cattle Judging Contest organizers will shift the judging class schedule to ensure milking cows shown on Monday are back to the stalls by 9 a.m. Sunday. Animals must be washed and clipped. In case of refusal to comply, any or all premiums may be forfeited and the exhibitor, including partnerships, may be barred from the showing and/or selling cattle at World Dairy Expo.

#### **Ultrasounding Before Exhibiting**

Exhibitors wishing to have animals ultrasounded before entering the Showring may do so. Proceed to the ultrasound tent to coordinate with the ultrasound crew. Results of the ultrasound will be kept confidential and will not affect exhibition status.

#### Conflict of Interest Policy Regarding Official Judges

The animal in question will be allowed to circle the ring but must be placed by the Associate Judge. If both the Official and Associate Judge have a conflict of interest in placement of an animal, Show Management will designate an alternate judge for placement of the animal. Exhibitors will be notified of the conflict of interest during reasons for the class.

#### **Breeding Animals**

Every female over 24 months of age must have calved within 18 months of the show or proven to be with calf or have a pregnancy. Animals shown in the Milking Yearling and older classes must be shown in milking form.

#### Clones

All clones will be considered as offspring of the donor's dam and sire. Please consider this when entering Produce of Dam and Dam & Daughter classes.

#### **Cell Phones**

The use of cell/smart phones or any personal electronic communication device in the Showring is strictly prohibited, with exception of providing evidence of certificate of animal registry for group classes.

#### Substitutions

Each exhibitor will be granted one entry substitution at no charge per year. Substitution criteria includes:

1. Substitute animal must be same breed as original entry (of any age animal); 2. Both animals must have **IDENTICAL** ownership printed on registration papers; 3. Class designation must be made no later than breed show check-in; and 4. Substitution must be made no later than time of breed show check-in. Additional substitutions will be a fee of \$150.00 per entry. Original animal entry class transfers, as defined below, will not be considered as a substitution.

#### **Production/Age Cow Class Transfers**

Animals shall enter and show in only one class. An original cow entry may be moved, within the same breed show, from her age-appropriate class into the Production Cow Class, or from the Production Cow Class into her age-appropriate class. Class designation must be made no later than breed show check-in. Animals sold and transferred after the breed show check-in will remain in the class designated at the time of check-in.

#### Heifer/Milking Class Transfers

Animals shall enter and show in only one class, in one breed show. Transfers between equivalent heifer and milking classes will be permitted, for the original animal entered, based on calving status. Class designation must be made no later than breed show check-in, with exception for animals that calve after check-in, and must be transferred to their respective milking class.

#### **Erroneous Entry**

Animals that have been erroneously entered may, at the discretion of the Breed Superintendent, be transferred to their proper classes at cattle check-in.

#### **Showring Numbers**

Each individual animal or group entry will receive a unique Showring number (backtag). Each entry will be issued two (2) backtags per class with the Showring number. These official Showring cards will be available for pick up at the breed meetings. Following the breed meetings, Showring backtags will be available <u>only</u> in the Dairy Cattle Show Office, top level of the Coliseum. Backtags must accompany the animal/group through the Hair Tent and be displayed in the exhibitor's show harness while in the Showring so that the animal may be properly checked-in and placed. The backtag must also accompany the animal through the ultrasound and milk-testing tents.

#### **Group Classes**

All group class entries are ONLINE ONLY and must be made prior to their respective breed show meeting. No ringside entries will be accepted. Registration certificates for all animals entered in any group class must be submitted electronically with online individual animal entries. Original registration papers must be available in the Showring for Group classes. Failure to present registration certificates for any animals entered in a group will automatically disqualify the group. Animals participating in any group class must have checked-in ringside for their individual class.

#### Ownership

To be eligible for competition, whether single or in groups, animals must be entered exactly as ownership appears on the registration certificate. The registration certificate showing the most recent date of activity will be considered official. Sale animal ownership will be that of the consignor. Original registration certificates showing ownership must be available, for verification by the Breed Superintendent, at anytime after the animals are housed.

Animals owned in partnership may be shown in the name of the partnership only, except for "Family" as defined on page 18, under EXHIBITOR DEFINED. For example, if Exhibitor A and Exhibitor B own an animal in partnership and each owns animals individually, three (3) separate exhibitors exist.

1 for Exhibitor A; 1 for Exhibitor B; 1 for Exhibitor A & B Partnership

New ownerships can be created after the entry deadline, providing the <u>animal is entered</u>. **Ownership cannot change after the animal is checked in ringside for its individual class**. In the case of sale animals and animals sold after entry, notify the Dairy Cattle Show Office, top level of the Coliseum. Every attempt to announce the new owner will be made. Premiums will be paid to the new owner when complete address and tax identification information is provided.

#### **Breeder Defined**

The owner of the dam at the time of service shall be considered the breeder of the animal. Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family, and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as exhibits of one breeder. **Please Note:** To qualify for Bred & Owned Awards, one of the original owners must be listed as one of the current owners. Bred & Owned should also be checked on the entry form. (NOTE: The Brown Swiss Association has a revised definition for the International Brown Swiss Show, page 40.)

#### **Exhibitor Defined**

The exhibitor must be the owner. In the case where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family or partnership, or youth leasees within a family unit or partnership, and are residing on one farm or breeding establishment, and where the herd is one unit; all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for all group classes. Members of one family and/or partnership, where cattle are not housed as one unit, will each be considered as a single exhibitor.

#### **Family Defined**

Immediate family is defined as a person's parents, siblings, spouse, children, grandparents, grandchildren, and nieces and/or nephews.

#### **Premier Breeder**

The breeder winning the most points (not to exceed six animals) in the open single classes exhibited by themselves and/or other exhibitors, shall be designated the Premier Breeder. In classes with 10 or fewer animals, no more than two head per breeder will be counted toward premier points.

Unique partnerships must be entered as separate premier breeder entries. If Breeder A and Breeder B bred an animal in partnership and each breed animals individually, three separate premier breeder entries exist.

1 for Breeder A; 1 for Breeder B; 1 for Breeder A & B Partnership

#### **Premier Exhibitor**

The exhibitor winning the most points (not to exceed six animals) which he/she owns and exhibits in the open single classes, shall be designated the Premier Exhibitor. In classes with 10 or fewer animals, no more than two head per exhibitor will be counted toward premier points.

#### Premier Breeder & Premier Exhibitor of the Heifer Show

The same rules will apply as listed for Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor. Spring Heifer Calves through Fall Yearling Heifers (not in milk) are eligible for nomination. These calves and heifers may also be eligible for the overall Premier Breeder and/or Premier Exhibitor.

Premier Breeder & Premier Exhibitor (Heifer Show and Overall) Online Entry NEW for 2025: Exhibitors must submit their Premier Exhibitor and Breeder entries online. All breed Premier entries are due by 11:59 p.m. the night of the Breed Meeting. Login is not required, provide your email address (optional) to receive confirmation of your entries. To assist exhibitors with Premier Breeder entries, the online system is searchable for animals being exhibited at World

Dairy Expo that you have bred but no longer own. Entries open September 24, 2025.

#### Premier Sire & Premier Sire of the Heifer Show

The Premier Sire will be the sire winning the most points on not less than four and not more than eight progeny in the open single classes. The Premier Sire of the Heifer Show will be the sire winning the most points on not less than four and not more than eight progeny in the open single Heifer classes. Award is presented to the bull's current owner.

#### Premier Breeders, Premier Exhibitors and Premier Sire Point System

Points will be given to 20 places for females in determining Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor of the Heifer Show and Overall and Premier Sire. If Milking Shorthorn futurity entrants show in their respective Two-Year-Old class, then premier points earned in their futurity will be forfeited. The premier points for those entries would result from the animal's placing in her respective breed show Two-Year-Old Cow class. The following points will be awarded:

#### Wisconsin Animal Health Regulations Related to World Dairy Expo Division of Animal Health

Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (608) 224-4874

#### WARNING

ALL required health papers must accompany the cattle and be available for inspection upon arrival. Cattle will not be health tested on the facility grounds for the purposes of showing. World Dairy Expo staff, with assistance from the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP), United States Department of Agriculture and the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine, will check all papers. Animals will not be allowed on the grounds until health papers have been verified.

Please bring a printed copy of all health papers to turn in upon arrival. Cattle without health papers:

- 1) Will be placed in a quarantine area until proper health papers are presented OR
- 2) Will be required to leave the grounds

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza A (HPAI/H5N1) Testing Requirements
HPAI/H5N1 continues to be detected in dairy farms in the United States. As a result,
federal and state orders requiring testing remain in effect. The required test for HPAI/
H5N1 is an Influenza A PCR, and testing details will refer to Influenza A throughout this
document. Requirements for Influenza A testing are subject to change. A USDA Federal Order
dated April 24, 2024 and a WDATCP order effective June 19, 2024 require a negative Influenza
A PCR test on milk samples of all lactating dairy cattle with a collection date within 7 days of
interstate and Wisconsin, intrastate, movement. The test collection date, lab, accession number,
and result must be written clearly on the CVI. A second test is not required by the federal order
for cattle to return to the farm of origin from a show or exhibition if the event does not exceed 10
days in length. Contact your state for requirements to return home after the show.

#### **Identification Requirements**

All cattle attending World Dairy Expo must have official individual identification regardless of age. Acceptable forms of animal identification are: a USDA AIN 840 RFID tag, a Canadian AIN RFID 124 tag, or, if applied prior to November 5, 2024 a USDA AIN 840 visual only tag.

\*NEW for 2025: Official identification applied after November 5, 2024 must be electronic (RFID) AND visually readable. Cattle with USDA 840 visual only tags applied before this date may continue to use that tag for the rest of that animal's life.

#### **Paperwork Requirements**

All cattle must have a printed certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI, also known as a health certificate) documenting official animal identification and Influenza A test collection date, lab, accession number, and result. A printed copy of each lactating animal's negatie Influenza A test results is also required.

#### Cattle from Texas and Michigan's Federal TB Free Zone

As long as you are not involved in any TB-positive or exposed herd investigations, here's what you need to bring in cattle from these states:

- 1. You must have a printed, Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI, also known as a health certificate) with an inspection date within 30 days of arrival to World Dairy Expo.
- Each animal must be officially identified as stated above in Identification Requirements. There is no age or sexual status exemption for the ID requirement.
- B. Influenza A: Ă USDA Federal Order dated April 24, 2024 requires a negative Influenza A PCR test on milk samples of all lactating dairy cattle with a collection date within 7 days of interstate movement. The test collection date, lab, accession number, and result must be written clearly on the CVI. A printed copy of each lactating animal's negative Influenza A test results is also required.
- 4. Tuberculosis: Each animal needs either a negative individual tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to the date of import to Wisconsin or, if the animals originate from a currently accredited TB-free herd, individual TB tests are not required, but the accreditation number and the date of the last whole-herd TB test must be on the CVI. A whole herd TB test is not required if the animals are individually tested. There is no age or sexual status exemption for the TB test requirement.
- 5. A brucellosis test, vaccination or statement is not required at this time.
- 6. No other tests or statements are required at this time.
- 7. An import permit is not required.
- 8. If there is a current vesicular stomatitis diagnosis or quarantine in the state of origin, effective May 30, 2014, Wisconsin no longer requires a permit or special statements.
- If the animals will be offered for sale, they must meet the requirements listed in the World Dairy Expo premium book.

#### Cattle from Michigan's federal Modified Accredited (MA) Zone

These rules apply to cattle from the following Michigan counties: **Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency** and **Oscoda**. The import regulations for Michigan's MA Zone are the same for World Dairy Expo as they are for other cattle imports, with the exception of the show-only statement (see item 1 below):

- You must have a current certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI, also known as a health certificate). The CVI must include a version of the following statement: "This animal is/ these animals are coming to World Dairy Expo only and will return to the state of origin after Expo."
- Each animal must be officially identified as stated above in Identification Requirements. There is no age or sexual status exemption for the ID requirement.
- Influenza A: Ă USDA Federal Order dated April 24, 2024 requires a negative Influenza A
  PCR test on milk samples of all lactating dairy cattle with a collection date within 7 days of
  interstate movement. The test collection date, lab, accession number, and result must be
  written clearly on the CVI. A printed copy of each lactating animal's negative Influenza A
  test results is also required.
- 4. Tuberculosis: Each animal must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days before the date of import and originate from a herd that has had a negative whole-herd TB test for all animals one year and older within the last 12 months. The injection dates of both tests must be written clearly on both the import permit application form (see #4) and the CVI. There is no age or sexual status exemption for the TB test requirement.
- 5. An import permit is required. The import permit application form is available from: <a href="https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs\_Services/WorldDairyExpo.aspx">https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs\_Services/WorldDairyExpo.aspx</a>, or you can have it faxed to you by calling (608) 224-4874 during regular business hours. Fill it out completely all the boxes marked with an asterisk are required. You will need to write in the Alliant Energy Center's livestock premises code, which is 004A6S7. Import permit applications without the livestock premises code will not be processed. Note: The "applicant" who signs the form can be the owner, or it can be the veterinarian or someone from the vet clinic staff it doesn't have to be the owner. When the form is completed, fax or email it, along with the signed and dated CVI, to (608) 224-4871 or <a href="mailto:DATCPAnimalImports@wisconsin.gov">DATCPAnimalImports@wisconsin.gov</a>. When the import permit is approved, a permit number will be issued by a Wisconsin state veterinarian and provided back to requestor. The permit number must be written on the CVI.
- 6. A brucellosis test, vaccination or statement is not required at this time.
- 7. No other tests or statements are required at this time.
- If there is a current vesicular stomatitis diagnosis or quarantine in the state of origin, effective May 30, 2014, Wisconsin no longer requires a permit or special statements.
- 9. If you intend to sell animals at Expo, you may do so only if the animals return to their state of origin after the show (as stated on your certificate of veterinary inspection). The animals may then travel to their new owner with a new CVI. Make sure the animals meet the import requirements of the state of destination. Please consult the World Dairy Expo premium book for any additional testing requirements.

#### **Cattle from All Other States**

For animals from the states that aren't listed above, the import requirements are the same as for other cattle imports.

- You must have a current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI, also known as a health certificate).
- 2. Each animal must be officially identified as stated above in Identification Requirements. There is no age or sexual status exemption for the ID requirement.
- 3. Influenza A: A USDA Federal Order dated April 24, 2024 requires a negative Influenza A PCR test on milk samples of all lactating dairy cattle with a collection date within 7 days of interstate movement. The test collection date, lab, accession number, and result must be written clearly on the CVI. Aprinted copy of each lactating animal's negative Influenza A test results is also required.
- 4. Tuberculosis testing is not required at this time.
- 5. A brucellosis test, vaccination or statement is not required.
- 6. No other tests or statements are required at this time.
- 7. An import permit is not required.
- 8. If there is a current vesicular stomatitis diagnosis or quarantine in the state of origin, effective May 30, 2014, Wisconsin no longer requires a permit or special statements.
- If the animals will be offered for sale, they must meet the requirements listed in the World Dairy Expo Premium Book.

#### **Cattle from Outside the United States**

To bring in cattle from outside the United States, you will need to meet the import requirements established by the United States Department of Agriculture. You can learn more at the website for the National Center for Import and Export (NCIE), https:\\www.aphis.usda.gov/aphis/ourfocus/importexport or by calling the NCIE at (301)851-3300.

#### **General Notes**

All cattle exhibited must be free of contagious and infectious diseases, including ringworm, scabies, mange, warts and pinkeye. Cattle under quarantine are not eligible for exhibition. Cattle that come from an area which is considered to be quarantined because of the presence of or exposure to a highly contagious disease cannot be shown at World Dairy Expo. Expo or DATCP have the right to require such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animals exhibited, and to exclude or remove, under a permit from DATCP, any animal afflicted or suspected of being afflicted with any contagious disease.

**Drug usage**: Cattle at the show may only be treated with USDA-licensed FDA-approved drugs. Withdrawal time periods must be strictly observed. Extra label use of all drugs must be under the direction of a licensed veterinarian. Evidence of same shall be provided in writing if requested by Expo or DATCP.

## - World Dairy Expo Exhibitor Guidelines for Animal CVI and Influenza A Testing -

Things You Need To Know

- 1. You will need a current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for all animals coming to WDE.
- 2. Individual lactating cows will also require a negative Influenza A milk sample to get into Expo.
- In order to return home from Expo, you must work closely with your veterinarian and your State's Animal Health Officials (SAHO) to develop a plan that will not require a routine Influenza A test to be done at Expo.
- 4. To help accommodate travel guidelines, Expo will permit early departures.
- 5. Veterinary services will be available at Éxpo as they always have been.
  - If the WDE Vet Team identifies an animal showing clinical signs that warrant an Influenza A test, the milk sample PCR test will be administered.
- It is possible that additional testing requirements for animal movement across the Canadian border, interstate within the US and intrastate in WI will change between now and your departure for World Dairy Expo.

Planning Your Trip To Expo

Exhibitors must understand your state's and the federal Influenza A testing requirements for interstate travel, including your trip to and return from Expo.

- 1. Work with your herd veterinarian and State Animal Health Office (SAHO). Identify when:
  - a. The date that a milk sample collection will need to occur for a negative Influenza A test to meet federal interstate and Wisconsin entry requirements.
  - b. Anticipated date to receive Influenza A milk sample test results.
  - c. Identify the National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) or Canadian Animal Health Surveillance System (CAHSS) lab the milk sample will be tested at, when samples are accepted and run, and how long it typically takes to get results.
  - d. Date of planned departure to Expo.
  - e. Date of expected arrival to Expo.

Planning Your Trip Back Home from Madison

Work with your herd veterinarian and SAHO for any federal or state regulatory requirements based on:

- Departure date from Expo.
- Date of expected arrival back home

Expo will allow early departures only to allow you to meet Influenza A test requirements without another test to return home.

Animals are eligible for early release if they meet the following criteria:

- 1. If you have lactating dairy cattle (no heifer-only groups are eligible).
- 2. If your travel and exhibition time at World Dairy Expo would meet one of these two requirements:
  - a. If your travel and exhibition time will exceed the USDA order which states that, "animals may travel to their home herd using the same negative test result [that they came in on], provided the exhibition, show or sale does not exceed 10 days of length and a new test would be required.
  - b. If your travel and exhibition time will exceed your local state or provincial order of a shorter length of time (ex: 7 days) on the same negative test and a new test would be required.
- If your non-lactating cattle are traveling with lactating cattle that would be outside of travel time granted by the USDA or state, they are eligible to leave.
- 4. Proof of testing and travel time is the burden of the dairy cattle exhibitor.
- You must have at least one lactating animal that arrives on-grounds at World Dairy Expo, to be eligible.

Home State & Federal Influenza A Test Requirement Responsibility

Exhibitors must understand your state's and the federal Influenza Atesting requirements for interstate travel, including your trip to and return from Expo.

- Early departure, exhibitors must register an early departure date so breed superintendents and Expo show staff can plan accordingly. You may do this with your entries or by September 18. at the latest.

- 3. Departure Time: at the conclusion of their breed show (or after 6 p.m.) until 12 a.m. midnight.

## - World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics -

World Dairy Expo is one of the premier dairy shows in the world. As an elite show, World Dairy Expo has the responsibility of maintaining a first-class image of fairness and ethics. The regulation of unethical practices is necessary to maintain a positive international reputation and to make sure good animal husbandry is on display for all spectators. World Dairy Expo seeks to promote exceptional animal practices, attractive exhibits and a high-quality show for exhibitors and spectators.

World Dairy Expo endorses the <u>PDCA Show Ring Code of Ethics</u> (adopted February 2025) in all breed shows and will support the judges and the respective National Breed Associations to ensure show procedures are within these guidelines.

By entering an animal at World Dairy Expo:

- The owner(s), the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal, consent to the collection of materials described in the World Dairy Expo Ethics Testing Actions and agree to supply proper animal and personal identification when asked by World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff or Show Management.
- An individual who is not an owner or exhibitor, such as the string manager or string staff/personnel, who commits a violation of the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics, is subject to the same ethics enforcement procedures and sanctions as an owner. When making entries, a string manager of record (including name and phone number while at World Dairy Expo) must be identified.

To identify unethical showring procedures, World Dairy Expo shall adhere to the following course of action.

#### **World Dairy Expo Ethics Testing Actions**

World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff have the authority to perform the following on any animal entered at World Dairy Expo:

- a. Pull hair samples.
- b. Measure topline and tailhead hair length.
- c. Draw blood samples.
- d. Perform an ultrasound of the udder, prior to milkout. \*Before each show, ultrasound is available for any exhibitor to voluntarily have their animal scanned. The results will be confidentially shared with the exhibitor.
- e. Perform a milkout and collect a milk sample of any individual cow or cows.
- f. Collect and test any other body fluids of the animal.
- g. Use any technology, including infrared photography or video surveillance, to determine if a violation has occurred.
- h. Require delivery of hypodermic syringes, needles or other devices, swabs, cloths, or other material, or samples of any medicine, preparation, or substance, whether in liquid or other form, in the possession or control of the exhibitor, the fitter, agents or persons acting on behalf of the exhibitor, for the purpose of laboratory analysis.
- i. Direct examination.
- i. Any other generally accepted technology, technique or evaluation not listed above.

Following the judging of the milking cow classes and prior to milkout:

- At least the top one third of each class will be ultrasounded. Random cows may also be ultrasounded as determined by the World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff.
- The top six animals in all lactating cow classes will have a milk sample taken. Milk samples from additional cows may also be collected at the discretion of World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff.
- The following animals from all Open and Junior breed Shows will be ultrasounded and milk samples taken following the completion of their breed show:
- Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Honorable Mention Grand Champion
- Senior Champion, Reserve Senior Champion and Honorable Mention Senior Champion
- Intermediate Champion, Reserve Intermediate Champion and Honorable Mention Intermediate Champion
- All lactating animals competing in the Supreme Champion Ceremony, both Open and Junior, will be ultrasounded and milk sampled again after exiting the Showring.

The leads person on the halter of the animal selected to have an ultrasound and/or milk sample will be presented with a colored card while in the Showring that directs the leads person to the ethics tent for an ultrasound and/or milk sample of the animal selected. It is the responsibility of the leads person to ensure the animal, her ultrasound/milk sample card and back tag accompany the animal to the ethics tent.

#### **Veterinary Care for Animal in Showring**

If, for whatever reason, an animal goes down in the showring and can get back up on her own and stabilize herself, the animal may continue to be shown. If the animal is taken out of the showring she may not reenter the showring, her official placing will be 'NP' (Not Placed) and she will not be eligible to participate in any group class.

## - World Dairy Expo Ethics Violations -

The following actions are considered violations of the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics and fall into one of two categories:

<u>Category 2 Violations</u>: Violations that have the potential to cause serious harm to the health or welfare of the animal, are done to artificially change the appearance of an animal and/or are done with intent. Category 2 ethics violations are:

- Misrepresenting the age, lineage/breed and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is entered.
- Hosing an animal, which is defined as the administration of fluids by mouth through a hose or a tube that is hooked directly to a water spigot or water supply, is prohibited at any time, while at World Dairy Expo.
  - a. Administration of fluids by mouth is permissible until 12:00 a.m. on the day the animal is to show, if they are administered by a conventional drench device (16 ounces or less) or by a stomach or rumen tube and is delivered by manual pumping or gravity flow from a standard pail or bucket only.
- b. After 12:00 a.m. on the day the animal is to show, no administration of fluids by mouth is allowed, unless it is deemed therapeutically necessary, and is then only administered by the official World Dairy Expo Veterinarian.
- Artificially altering the appearance of the udder either by injecting or infusing a substance anywhere on or in the udder to enhance the appearance of the fore udder/fore udder attachment, rear udder/rear udder attachment and/or udder seam, or by infusion of any substance to fill a quarter(s).
  - a. Intramammary treatment of mastitis at World Dairy Expo will be permitted based on verifiable need but limited to the use of approved intramammary mastitis tube(s) administered as directed by the label.
  - b. Off-label use and/or the use of non-FDA approved mastitis treatment is prohibited while at World Dairy Expo.
- 4. Using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease is prohibited. Ice pieces may be used on an animal if they are contained in a plastic bag that is moving up and down the udder crease.
- Inserting any matter under the skin (either surgically or by injection) or into any body cavity for non-therapeutic purposes, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
- 6. Administering an injected or applied substance to alter the carriage of the tail or other body parts.
- 7. Adding real or artificial hair or hair-like substances to any part of the animal, except for false switches
- 8. Failure to provide proper/accurate animal and/or personal identification when asked by World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff or Show Management.
- 9. An animal witnessed leaving the World Dairy Expo pavilion/tent area, as designated by posted signage, and going out to the trailers or parking areas, without breed superintendent approval is strictly prohibited. After health check-in is complete, no animal shall leave the World Dairy Expo grounds or pavilion area, designated by posted signage, until approved move-out on Friday at 5:30 p.m.
- 10. Mistreatment of an animal.

<u>Category 1 Violations</u>: Violations done by mistake or lack of judgment, that do not pose an animal health or welfare concern.

- 1. Topline or tailhead hair exceeds 1 ½ inches from the skin as measured and officially confirmed by three World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff members.
- Changing the natural color of the animal is prohibited. However, external applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including, by way of example, color touch up of a maximum of 4 inches on either side of the topline, hoof polishes and false switches.
- 3. Improper fitting practices, such as overfilling and overbagging the udder.
- Challenging, interfering or criticizing the judge, Show Management, an Ethics Staff Member or volunteer or other exhibitors while in the Showring.
- 5. Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of the leads person or their representative(s).

Any other actions not listed above that are deemed to be an ethics violation by the World Dairy Expo Ethics Coordinator are subject to penalties, at the discretion of the World Dairy Expo Ethics Review Committee (WDEERC), during the World Dairy Expo Ethics Enforcement Process.

## - World Dairy Expo Ethics Penalties -

An ethics violation and penalty may be imposed on an animal, the owner(s) of the animal, the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal. Other animals in the string, and their associated owner(s), may still participate at World Dairy Expo. Each person, including each individual owner, individual members of a partnership or ownership group, the string manager, any string staff member, and the animal will be evaluated independently.

The World Dairy Expo Ethics Penalties are as follows:

If a <u>Category 2</u> ethics violation is observed by World Dairy Expo Ethics Staff and confirmed by the World Dairy Expo Ethics Coordinator during World Dairy Expo (beginning when cattle arrive at World Dairy Expo through when cattle depart World Dairy Expo), the following penalties will be immediately imposed, at a minimum:

- The back tag of the animal in violation will be taken away and the animal will be ineligible to show. All animals with the same owner(s) and/or ownership group may not be exhibited.
- The individual(s) conducting the ethics violation, whether it is the animal's owner(s), the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal, will be required to serve, at a minimum, a two-year ban for the following two years.
- Additional penalties against the owner(s), the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal may be applied after the conclusion of World Dairy Expo, upon further review of the case.

If, after the conclusion of World Dairy Expo, the World Dairy Expo Ethics Coordinator determines, based on available evidence, that a <u>Category 2</u> ethics violation occurred, all of the following apply:

- 1. The animal will have its placings removed and no premiums will be awarded.
- 2. At a minimum, a two-year ban of one or more of the following:
  - the animal.
  - the owner(s),
  - the string manager,
  - any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal.
- 3. A longer ban may be imposed if this is the second ethics violation or greater, regardless of category, and the second violation occurs within five years of the first violation, or if deemed appropriate based on the nature of the violation and at the sole discretion of the WDEERC.
- 4. All individuals found guilty of an ethics violation will not be eligible to be on a ballot to judge at or represent World Dairy Expo in an official capacity for five years.
- 5. The ethics violation will be part of the official World Dairy Expo records for the owner(s), the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal.

If evidence presented by the World Dairy Expo Ethics Coordinator determines a <u>Category 1</u> ethics violation was identified, the following applies:

- 1. If the violation is a topline violation, as measured and officially confirmed by three WDE Ethics Staff members, and it is the first offense for the owner(s), the string manager and/or string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal, the only penalty imposed is the animal will not be allowed to show at the current World Dairy Expo. The animal will not be subject to other Category 1 penalties.
- 2. All other Category 1 ethics violations are subject to the following penalties:
  - a. The animal will have its placings removed and no premiums will be awarded.
  - b. At a minimum, a one-year ban of one or more of the following:
    - · the animal,
    - the owner(s),
    - the string manager.
    - any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal.
  - c. A longer ban may be imposed if this is the second ethics violation (including topline violations) or greater, regardless of category, and the second violation occurs within three years of the first violation, or if deemed appropriate based on the nature of the violation and at the sole discretion of the WDEERC.
  - d. All individuals found guilty of an ethics violation will not be eligible to be on a ballot to judge at or represent World Dairy Expo in an official capacity for three years.
  - The ethics violation will be part of the official World Dairy Expo records for the owner(s), the string manager and/or any string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal.

If an ethics violation is a second violation or greater for any of the associated owner(s), string manager, and/or string staff member handling, caring for or fitting the animal, regardless of the event that occurred, it is automatically considered a Category 2 violation.

In all instances, the penalty imposed may be greater than the minimum penalty noted above and is at the sole discretion of the WDEERC.

## - World Dairy Expo Ethics Enforcement Process -

The World Dairy Expo Ethics Review Committee (WDEERC) will anonymously review ethics violations to impose penalties. The WDEERC will include the World Dairy Expo Board President, Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Committee Chair, Overall Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent, a member of the Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Committee and the WDE General Manager. If a member of the WDEERC must recuse him or herself, an alternate(s) will be appointed to the WDEERC by the WDE General Manager or designee. The WDEERC acts by majority vote and may adopt procedural rules to govern its proceedings that are not inconsistent with the enforcement process outlined below.

- 1. Within two weeks of the completion of World Dairy Expo, the Ethics Coordinator will submit a report to the General Manager regarding any violations that occurred and the category of such violations. The Ethics Coordinator will share the official ethics testing results with the WDE General Manager. The General Manager will work with the WDE Dairy Systems Manager to process any violation and present anonymously to the WDEERC. The WDEERC may seek additional counsel as deemed necessary.
- Upon receiving notice that an ethics violation has occurred, the General Manager will notify the
  owner(s), as listed on the animal's entry form, of the ethics violation by email. A courtesy copy
  of the letter will also be sent by overnight mail. It is the owner's responsibility to notify any other
  individual(s) associated with the ethics violation, including the string manager or any string staff
  member involved in handling, caring for or fitting the animal.
- The owner(s) will have one week from the date of receiving the ethics violation email to submit, via email only, a letter of response. An in-person or virtual meeting with the WDEERC may also be requested.
- The WDEERC will meet, either in-person or virtually, to analyze the violation, review any written
  or verbal response (if submitted in the time allowed) and/or hear from the accused individual(s).
- 5. The WDEERC will then determine the penalty(ies) that will be imposed. The accused individual(s) will be informed of the penalty(ies) by email and mail by November 1, or as soon as possible thereafter recognizing there may be delays beyond the WDEERC's control.
- 6. Following confirmation that the printed letter has been received, any necessary placings updates will be made, and the placings will be considered final.
- World Dairy Expo will issue a statement regarding the official results once results have been finalized. At the sole discretion of World Dairy Expo, any ethics violation and associated penalties may be publicly disclosed at this time.
- 8. Barring an owner will result in any animal owned fully or in partnership with that individual, farm and/or affiliated entity not being allowed to enter, exhibit or sell in World Dairy Expo shows and/or sales.
- Any barred individual will be ineligible to be present in the Showring, and/or serve in any other official capacity for the length of the bar.
- 10. Any individual who is deemed responsible for an ethics violation within five years of a previous Category 2 violation and/or within three years of a previous Category 1 violation, must be approved by World Dairy Expo's Executive Committee prior to being nominated to represent World Dairy Expo on the Board of Directors, an official committee or as a contracted judge.

Any questions related to the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics may be directed to Dr. David Jeans, World Dairy Expo Ethics Coordinator, or a member of the World Dairy Expo Ethics Review Committee as noted above.

Throughout the ethics process, to the extent possible, World Dairy Expo will maintain the anonymity of animals, owner(s) and/or associated individual(s). All violations of the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics and decisions of the WDEERC are final. Nothing in the foregoing should be interpreted as preventing World Dairy Expo from publicly disclosing the results of the ethics review process (consistent with Item 7 above) or as may be required by applicable law.

#### **Rules for Junior-Owned Animals** Exhibited at the International Ayrshire Show

All general rules of World Dairy Expo apply, including the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics.

The International Junior Avrshire Show will be held at the same time as the Open Show. Juniors will be recognized. placed and awarded ribbons and premiums by stepping forward in their respective Open Show classes. Ribbons are provided by the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders' Association.

- 1. Eligibility: Participation in this show is open to all young men and women who own registered Ayrshires. Exhibitors may participate after they reach 9 years of age and until December 31 of year in which he or she turns 21 years old.
- 2. Ownership: Animals may be owned solely by the junior exhibitor or in a partnership provided the junior exhibitor's name appears on the registration paper, prior to August 1 of the current year, All purchased animals must be transferred by August 1 of the current year. The date of sale and not the delivery date will be considered the transfer date. Registration papers will be checked at the show. In lieu of ownership, an Ayrshire Breeders' Association lease agreement will be accepted. The lease form must be received by the Ayrshire Breeders' Association office prior to August 1st.
- 3. Participation: a) A junior exhibitor may exhibit up to two (2) animals per class, with a substitute showman, as long as the substitute showman is the same age as or younger than the junior exhibitor. Not more than four may be shown in the entire show that were not bred by exhibitor. In order to qualify as breeder, the registration paper must show the junior exhibitor or a partnership including the junior exhibitor as the breeder. b) Adults are not allowed to show in any Junior class or assist in the ring. c) White pants and an official World Dairy Expo Junior Show shirt are required to be worn or the junior will not be allowed to show his/her animal.
- 4. Leadsperson: To be eligible to compete at National Shows, entries must be shown by the Junior owner in all cases, except by prior written approval. Alternate Leadsperson forms must be submitted to the Ayrshire Breeders' Association office or ABA representative by 5:00 p.m. the day before the show. Written requests must be submitted by this time or the animal is ineligible to show, unless there is an unforeseen circumstance. Alternate leadspersons must be (1) siblings of the exhibitor who are eligible to show by age, OR (2) if not a sibling, be of the same age category (Junior – ages 9-12) (Intermediate- ages 13-15) (Senior – ages 16-21) as the exhibitor of the animal being shown. All ages are as of January 1st of the year of competition.
- 5. Entry Requirements: All open show entry requirements and fees apply. The stall fee will qualify the exhibitor for open and junior show participation. All entries must be made at WorldDairyExpo.com online entry with proper payment. Junior Exhibitor must be checked on the animal entry to signify Junior ownership.
- 6. Financial Support: Premiums of \$1,735 will be paid by World Dairy Expo. Total premiums paid in the junior show will not exceed \$1,735. If total potential junior premiums exceed \$1,735 adjustments will be made per class.

Brown Swiss Bred & Owned Rule: Approved by the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association effective for the 2025 National Shows and supercedes World Dairy Expo Bred & Owned rule: A. EXHIBITOR & FAMILY DEFINED: The exhibitor must be the owner. In case a herd is registered or bred in the names of different members of a family, residing on one farm or breeding establishment, and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for all group classes. However, members of one family, where cattle are not housed as one unit, will not be considered as a single exhibitor.

B: OWNERSHIP: To be eligible for competition, whether single or in groups, animals must be entered exactly as ownership appears on the registration certificate. The registration certificate showing the most recent date of activity will be considered official. Sale animal ownership will be that of the consignor. Registration certificates showing ownership must be available.

Animals owned in partnership may be shown in the name of the partnership only, except for "Family Unit" as defined above, under EXHIBITOR DEFINED. 

Records received after that will be accepted only with a \$50 late fee. The DHI sheet showing credits up through July 1 will be accepted to update lifetime records. It is the owner's responsibility to supply these records. including the July test sheet.

The Total Performance Award is presented at each national show to the exhibitor whose cow has the highest score based on the above criteria. The winner at each show receives a banner. - B) Any animal sold or exhibited as registered by the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association can be genomic tested at the discretion of the Executive Secretary. All expenses to be paid by Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association.

## Rules for Junior-Owned Animals Exhibited at the International Brown Swiss Show

All General Rules of World Dairy Expo apply,

#### including the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics.

The International Junior Brown Swiss Show will be held at the same time as the Open Show. Juniors will be recognized by stepping forward in their respective Open Show classes.

#### Eliaibility Rules:

- 1. **Eligibility**: Junior must be 8-21 years of age by January 1 of the current year.
- 2. **Membership**: Junior must be a National Brown Swiss Junior member by August 1 of current show season.
- 3. Ownership: For an animal to be exhibited as Junior owned, in all classes, the recorded ownership must show in the sole ownership of the exhibitor or a partnership comprised of Brown Swiss Association Junior members. (Adult-Junior partnerships and family farm partnerships are not acceptable.) All transfers and recorded ownerships must be dated by August 1st of the current show year for all classes. If joint ownership, one of the owners must be declared the exhibitor during check-in. Awards will be presented as one unit, to all owners equally. Animals that are leased through the National Brown Swiss Association Lease Program are also eligible to be shown as juniors. The leased animal's recorded owners will receive open show awards.
- 4. The junior who owns or leases the animal is to show her. If the owner cannot attend the show, another National Brown Swiss Association Junior Member may show the animal with approval of an alternate leadsman form. Leased animals are not permitted to have an alternate leadsman. In a class where a junior member owns more than one animal, the owner must show one animal, another National Brown Swiss Association Junior Member may show the second animal.
- 5. **Entry**: All entries must be made at WorldDairyExpo.com online and junior exhibitor must be checked. A National Office representative will check junior eligibility.
- Show Attire: White pants and an official World Dairy Expo Junior Show shirt are required. Items of clothing with a farm name are not permitted.

#### Awards:

- First place junior in each class will receive a special award presented by International Brown Swiss Show Sponsors.
- First, second, and third place World Dairy Expo neck ribbons with medallions will be presented in each of the 17 female classes by KCCK Genetics. Dversville. IA.
- 3. A World Dairy Expo rosette will be presented to Junior Champion & Reserve, Senior Champion and Reserve, Grand Champion and Reserve by the listed award sponsor.
- 4. Juniors also receive production awards, courtesy of <u>Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association</u>, based on the highest 305d, ECM record. Official production records must be sent to and received by the National Brown Swiss office two weeks prior to show day. These awards are provided for a junior- owned animal in each of the following classes. Senior Two-Year-Old, Junior & Senior Three-Year-Olds, Four-Year-Old, Five-Year-Old, Six-Year-Old & Older and Component Merit Cows.
- Financial Support: Premiums of \$1,795 will be paid by World Dairy Expo. Total premiums paid in the junior show will not exceed \$1,795. If total potential junior premiums exceed \$1,795, adjustments will be made per class.



The International Junior Guernsey Show will be held at the same time as the Open Show. Juniors will be recognized, placed, and awarded ribbons by stepping forward in their respective Open Show classes. **Eligibility:** Participation is open to any AGA Junior Member who has not reached their 21st birthday by January 1st of the current year and are over the age of eight on that date. World Dairy Expo requires leadspersons to be at least nine years of age on Show Day.

**Ownership:** In all classes, the recorded ownership must show in the sole ownership of the junior exhibitor or partnership comprised of only AGA Junior Members or a participant in the American Guernsey Association Youth Lease Agreement Program, no adults or farm names may be listed. The qualifying record of ownership

or lease for animals, other than those bred by the junior exhibitor, shall be determined by the actual date the application for transfer of ownership was received in the offices of the American Guernsey Association. This date is automatically stamped on the front of the registration certificate and will be found with the transfer of ownership data. All guidelines and terms must have been followed and a copy of the signed and dated (on or before August 1, 2025) agreement must be present. If the participant is exhibiting under the American Guernsey Association Youth Lease Agreement Program, all guidelines and terms must have been followed and a copy of the signed and dated (on or before August 1, 2025) agreement must be present.

**Junior Bred & Owned:** An animal is eligible for the Junior Best Bred & Owned ribbon in each class when at least one of the current Junior owners is listed as one of the original breeders of the animal on the registration paper.

Participation: The listed owner of the animal must lead the animal. If the owner is not present, an AGA Junior Member the same age or younger may lead the animal. A substitute leadsperson may only be used at a single show per year for each animal. No person older than the owner, other than show management, may lead the animal in the ring at any time. Substitute leadspersons are not permitted for leased cattle. ## Rules for Junior Owned Animals Exhibited at the International Jersey Show

All general rules of World Dairy Expo apply, including the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics.

The International Junior Jersey Show will be held at the same time as the Open Show. Juniors will be recognized by stepping forward in their respective Open Show classes. <a href="Manerican Jersey Cattle Association"><u>Association</u></a> will award ribbons to the first, second and third place Juniors in each class.

- 1. <u>Eligibility</u>: Exhibitors must be no younger than 9 years of age as of the opening day of the show, and no older than 20 years of age as of January 1, 2025. U.S. residents must be members (junior or lifetime) of the American Jersey Cattle Association.
- 2. Entries: Animals are eligible when recorded by the American Jersey Cattle Association in the Herd Register or with Generation Count 4 or greater, or by Jersey Canada with registry status of 93.75% and greater. The exhibitor must be listed as Recorded Owner on the registration certificate, either (1) as the sole owner or (2) by his/her name in joint ownership. If the joint ownership includes more than one person meeting the eligibility requirements of Rule 1. (above), one of them must be declared as the exhibitor during check-in. Animals must be registered and/or transferred to meet one of the above ownership requirements on or before August 1, 2025. The date of registration and/or transfer is the Date Recorded printed on the registration certificate.
- 3. <u>Participation</u>: Entries must be shown by the exhibitor, except by prior written approval from Show Management. Alternate leadspersons (1) must be associated with the Herd Unit and also eligible to show by age, Rule 1 above, OR (2) if not, be the same age or younger than the exhibitor of the animal being shown. Requests for alternate leadsperson must be submitted to WDE Dairy Systems Manager on a WDE Alternate Leadsperson form no later than 5 p.m. the day prior to the show. No more than two (2) animals may be shown by one exhibitor in any one class. The exhibitor must lead the first entry and the second entry must be led by an alternate leadsperson as approved by Show Management. Adults are not allowed to show in any case.
- **4.** <u>Breeder Status</u>: In order to qualify for Premier Breeder points and Best Bred & Owned awards, the exhibitor declared at check-in must have his/her name recorded as a Breeder on the animal's registration certificate. These awards will be made only to the individual exhibitor in the case of partnership animals.
- **5. Financial Support**: Premiums will be paid by World Dairy Expo, with support from the American Jersey Cattle Association. The following premiums may be offered to junior-owned animals; however, total premiums paid in the junior show will not exceed \$2,930. If total potential junior premiums exceed \$2,930, adjustments will be made per each class.



It is the owner's responsibility to supply these records, including the July test sheet, if desired. Copies will be kept for the AMSS Representative to ensure correct calculations.

(a) **Production**: Points will be calculated in the following manner and added together for total production points:

Completed Lactations: number x 10 Lifetime Milk: (lbs) / 1,000

Lifetime Components: 2 x (lbs. fat + lbs. protein) / 100

(b) **Type**: Points will be calculated in the following manner and added together for total type points:

Classification Score: score value

Placing: 1st = 200, 2nd = 180, 3rd=160, etc... top 50% after 10th=10

(c) Total Points: Production and Type points will be added together to determine final points. If a tie exists, the cow with the highest 305d ME for milk production in any of her lactations will be the winner.

## Rules for Junior-Owned Animals Exhibited at the International Milking Shorthorn Show

All General Rules of World Dairy Expo apply, including the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy and Code of Ethics.

The International Junior Milking Shorthorn Show will be held at the same time as the Open Show. Juniors will be recognized, placed and awarded neck ribbons & medallions by stepping forward in their respective Open Show Classes. All juniors must wear the junior show shirt provided to be eligible to be recognized as a Junior.

Junior Eligibility: Participation in this show is open to youth with registered Milking Shorthorns. Exhibitors must be a minimum of 9-years-old by January 1st of the currnet year but have not reached their 21st birthday by January 1st in the year competing. Members who become 21 years of age during the current year will be allowed to compete in Junior activities until December 31st of the current year. Youth must be a member of the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society by August 1st of the current year. If the youth is not a member by August 1st, they must join before the Show by paying the \$25 junior membership fee and an additional \$5 penalty to become a junior member payable to the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society and turned into the AMSS Executive Secretary. Juniors are expected to follow the PDCA showmanship scorecard for all National Junior Shows.

- Registration: All animals must be registered in the full herdbook of the American Milking Shorthorn Society and have registry certificates issued by the American Milking Shorthorn Society. The certificate must be white and does not have the words "Not eligible to show" printed near the Executive Secretary's signature or as a watermark across the page. Animals with a prefix of GI, GI2, GR and GÉ are not eligible to be shown. Females with a 36000 or 37000 registration number are not eligible to be shown. Tattoo numbers, Fair Tags and/or RFID tags must correspond with the registry certificates. Registration papers will be checked at the Show by show management.
- Ownership: Ównership of the animal must be recorded in the AMSS herdbook in the name of the Junior exhibitor(s) by August 1st of the current year. Animals may be owned in partnerships, however all members of the partnership must be paid junior members of AMSJS and animal must be owned by August 1st. Acceptable wording of Farm or other entity should read: *Junior* member's name of Farm name or other entity (Ex: Nicholas Achen of Cherrywood Farm). The following will disqualify an animal from Junior show participation and recognition in the current year: Transferring an animal in or out of a Junior's name after August 1st of the show year or adding/dropping a junior member and/or adult as an owner after the deadline.
- Lease: Animals that are leased through the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society Lease Program are also eligible to be shown by juniors. Leases must be on file with the AMSS office by August 1st of the current year. Lessee must be a paid American Milking Shorthorn Junior Member. The Junior who leases the animal must show her. Only one AMSJS Junior Member may appear on each individual lease per animal. Multiple juniors are not permitted to lease the same animal. Alternate leadsperson are not permitted for leased animals except for an unforeseen circumstance.
- Participation: Up to two (2) animals may be exhibited by each exhibitor in any one class. One animal must be shown by an owner listed on the registration certificate who is a paid National Junior Member. The second animal may be shown if the alternate leadsperson form is completed. All rules for the alternate leadsperson form apply. A Junior can own multiple animals in a given class, but only two may be exhibited. Additional animals must be leased by another Junior or if animal is owned in a partnership can be exhibited by another member of the partnership.
- Alternate leadsperson: The Junior who owns the animal is to show her. If the owner cannot attend the Show, an Alternate Leadsperson must be a National Milking Shorthorn Junior member, who is the same age or younger **OR** up to three years older than the owner **OR** who is a sibling (full, half, step, foster) of the owner. All Alternate Leadspersons must meet the age quidelines of a minimum of 9-years-old but not have reached their 21st birthday by January Ist in the year competing. Altérnate Leadsperson may show the animal with approval of the Executive Secretary or board appointed delegate known as the "Breed Representative". A Request for Alternate Leadsperson form must be submitted to the AMSS Executive Secretary by email to executive-secretary@milkingshorthorn.com or hand delivered by 5 p.m. the day before the Show to either the Executive Secretary or Breed Representative. Requests must be submitted by this time or the animal is ineligible to show, unless there is an unforeseen circumstance. The owner of the animal is to show at at least one national qualifying Junior show, to receive Junior All American recognition. The Request for Alternate Leadsperson form is available at www.milkingshorthorn.com or from show management. The only exception to this rule is for an alternate leadsperson for showing/leading in the Champion Classes (Junior, Intermediate, Senior and/or Grand). Alternate Lead sperson in the champion classes must meet junior age quideline but does not have to be a National Milking Shorthorn Junior member.
- Bred & Owned: As of January 1, 2025, for a junior show animal to be eligible for Junior Bred and Owned, at least one of the Junior owners must be listed as a breeder on the registration paper. All owners listed must be AMSJS Members.
- The AMSS Hair Color Regulations must be followed (pg 67)
- Only the AMSS Executive Secretary or AMSS National Show Representative shall have authority in determining the eligibility of animals and ownership for numbers 1-8, above.
- Junior Premiums of \$1,180 will be paid by World Dairy Expo. All premiums will be paid directly to the exhibitors by World Dairy Expo.

### American Milking Shorthorn Society Black Hair Policy

- To be eligible to show a Milking Shorthorn, base hair color must be red, white or roan (red and white intermixed). No other base color is allowed.
- Disqualifications for color beyond the preceding include animals that are brindled with diffuse black hairs on locations other than the edge of the ear, edge of the muzzle or nape of shoulder, or animals that have more than one location with black hair on other parts of the body.
- "Black Hair" for purpose of these rules refers to hair that is black the entire length of the shaft to the root.
- Minimal black hair described as "ticking" around the edge of the ears, edge of the muzzle and shoulder nape is permissible.
- An animal is eligible to be shown if they have no more than one "spot" of black hair smaller than four square inches.
- "Black Spot" refers to areas of solid black hair or to areas of black roan with diffuse white or red hairs intermixed.
- Measurement is made around the distinct edge of the area in question.
- If an animal has one spot larger than four square inches, or more than one spot, they are ineligible to be shown.
- Any animal with one spot smaller than four square inches that is to be shown must be blood/ DNA typed for parental identification. If parental ID is confirmed the animal is eligible thereafter for all show and National awards.
- Any animal the Executive Secretary examines and finds to have one or multiple black spots. irregardless of eligibility for showing, are required to be blood/DNA typed for parental identification to maintain registry status.
- 11. As there exists a lack of uniformity in varying show venues across the country in response to enforcement of the Black Hair rule, the Board of AMSS has stipulated the following. Only the Executive Secretary of the American Milking Shorthorn Society shall have authority in determining eligibility of animals under the Black Hair Rule. The Executive Secretary is required to be in attendance at all accredited National Shows.
- 12. When the Executive Secretary of the American Milking Shorthorn Society is in attendance at a National Show, or if she/he are at any other venue in which Milking Shorthorns are being exhibited as registered cattle in the AMSS Herd Book, she/he may, at their discretion, or at the request of either the owner of an animal or other exhibitor, examine an animal for eligibility due to the above color requirements or other considerations.
- If the Executive Secretary is requested by a party other than the owner to examine an animal for any reason, the person requesting the examination must first post a \$150 nonrefundable fee with the Executive Secretary.

- 1. Animals must be Red and White in physical color. Any animal in question of this color status must submit a DNA sample to an accredited lab for a full genomic panel to prove color and identification of the animal in question. Results must be shared with RWDCA.
- 2. In order to enter/exhibit at any national and/or approved shows, Red & White animals must carry 87% dairy bloodlines as designated by RWDCA guidelines. Dairy bloodlines include: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein (Black & White and Red & White), Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Angler, Swedish Red, Aussie Red, Lineback and Rouge Flammande.
- 3. If for any reason an animal is in question for eligibility, the RWDCA management will be contacted before a final decision is rendered.
- 4. The RWDCA will accept original registration papers and/or a certificate of identification (CID) from Holstein Association USA. Other registration papers accepted will be from RWDCA, Holstein Association USA showing the suffix "RED" and Holstein Canada.
- 5. Animals are eligible to show in <u>ONE</u> breed show. For example, if an animal is shown in the International Red & White Show, it may not show in the International Holstein Show or International Junior Holstein Show.
- 6. All owners shown on registration paper must be a member in good standing of RWDCA.
- 7. All requirements listed above must be met 24 hours before the start of the show.

- 2) Exhibitors may participate after they reach nine years of age and until December 31 of the year in which he or she turns 21 years of age. Age is day of show.
- 3) Animals must be Red and White in physical color. Any animal in question of this color status must submit a DNA sample to an accredited lab for a full genomic panel to prove color and identification of the animal in question. Results must be shared with RWDCA.
- 4) To enter/exhibit at any national and/or approved shows, Red & White animals must carry 87% dairy bloodlines as designated by RWDCA guidelines. Dairy bloodlines include: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein (Black & White and Red & White), Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Angler, Swedish Red, Aussie Red, Lineback and Rouge Flammande.
- If for any reason an animal is in question for eligibility, the RWDCA management will be in contact before a final decision is rendered.
- 6) The RWDCA will accept registration papers and/or a certificate of identification (CID) from Holstein Association USA. Other registration papers accepted will be from RWDCA, Holstein Association USA showing the suffix "RED" and Holstein Canada.
- 7) LEASE: All animals must be owned or leased by the junior by July 15th of the current year. TRANSFER: For an animal (cow or heifer) being transferred to a Junior, or a partnership of Juniors, the transfer application must be received by the Holstein Association USA office on or before July 15th. Except for animals purchased by and/or leased to a Junior at the RWDCA National Convention Sale.
- 8) OWNERSHIP: Two or more juniors may own an animal. One junior must be on the halter to receive junior recognition. Awards will be presented as one unit, to all owners equally.

9) All entries must be shown by the Junior owner in all cases, except by prior written approval. An alternate leadsperson request form handwritten, or email 24 HOURS prior to the start of the show explaining in specific your reason for the absence and for final approval by the RWDCA. Any alternate leadsperson form can be turned into the RWDCA in advance, if you know of upcoming conflicts. Include in the statement- Name, age and signature of junior owner. Cell phone number of contact person. Class of animal. Name and age of alternate leadsperson (Up to three listed). Reason junior owner needs an alternate. If approved, the rules state the alternate must be the same age or younger as the junior owner. The alternate must also be a junior member of the RWDCA. Adults are not allowed to show in any case. If more than one animal owned by the same Junior is eligible for the championship class, another Junior may lead the other animal. Final approval will be decided by RWDCA staff and/or a member of the RWDCA Board of Directors.

The Junior requesting this form MUST have led their animal once <u>at a national, state or county show</u> before approval at ANY Fall show.

- 10) Dress code will be strictly enforced for juniors. White pants with an official show shirt must be worn or the junior will not be allowed to show (World Dairy Expo-Madison, WI and Premier National Junior Show-Harrisburg & Mid-East Fall Red & White Show-Louisville. KY).
- 11) Junior show classes consist of all female classes except Best Uddered of Show. There will be no junior show classes for group classes.
- 12) Bred & Owned: To be eligible for junior bred & owned, at least one of the original Junior owners must be listed as one of the current Junior owners. Adult-Junior partnerships are not acceptable. Family unit or farm partnerships will not qualify for Bred & Owned awards unless all partners are Junior members and listed on the certificate and at least one of them is an origial breeder/owner. Bred & Owned of the Junior Show class award is presented courtesy of Red & White Dairy Cattle Association.
- 13) Premiums of \$1,920 will be paid out to junior exhibitors. All premiums will be paid directly to the exhibitors by World Dairy Expo.

### Holstein Association USA - International Junior Holstein Show Rules

All general rules of World Dairy Expo apply, including the World Dairy Expo Showring Policy & Code of Ethics.

- A) Eligibility: Exhibitors must be a minimum of nine years old to participate on the day of the show, but not have reached their 21st birthday by January 1 in the year competing. Members who become 21 years of age during the current year will be allowed to compete in Junior activities until December 31 of the current year and not beyond that time. Exhibitors must be National Junior Members of the Holstein Association USA, Inc. Juniors entered in the show may submit applications on site for National Junior Membership with payment by 5 p.m. the day before the show.
- B) Entries: All animals must be registered by the Holstein Association USA, Inc. The Junior owner(s) or lessee must be recorded on the registration certificate. Animals must have a minimum of 87% Registered Holstein Ancestry (RHA) to be eligible for the designated shows.
- C) Ownership: Animal must be registered in the name of the Junior member or a partnership of Junior members, throughout the year exhibiting in order to qualify for Junior recognition. Adult-Junior and family or farm partnerships are not acceptable. For an animal (cow or heifer) being transferred to a Junior, or a partnership of Juniors, the transfer application must be received by the Holstein Association USA office on or before July 15 by 11:59 p.m. Eastern time of the current year. \*\*Canadian owned animals must be dually registered in Canada and the US. Animals must be transferred in Canada prior to transferring in the US. Transfers in the US must still be made by July 15, 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time. The following actions will disqualify an animal from Junior recognition: 1) Transferring an animal in or out of a Junior's name after July 15 of the show year or 2) adding or dropping any adult or junior member as an owner after the deadline.

- D) Lease: The Junior leasing program is designed to encourage young people to get involved in a dairy project and learn about animal care and responsibility. The leased animal remains in the original ownership and, if the leased animal is bred, any offspring are named using the owner's prefix.
  - 1. The leasing program is not available to youth who concurrently own any Registered Holsteins either as an individual or in partnership. However, if the lessee becomes the owner of the animal anytime during the year exhibiting, they will qualify for junior recognition.
  - 2. A maximum of two Registered Holsteins may be leased by any youth at one time. Animals may not be leased by partnerships.
  - 3. The lease may be terminated by either the owner (lessor) or the youth (lessee) by providing written notice to the other party 45 or more days before the intended termination date. A Lease Termination Report must be filed with Holstein Association USA, Inc. If the animal has been sold, submitting an application for transfer of ownership will also terminate the lease.
  - 4. The animal must be leased before she reaches her first birthday.
  - 5. Leased animals may only be shown by the lessee (Junior). If a leased animal is shown by an adult, the lease is automatically terminated. The leasing Junior must show the animal at all shows; no substitutions may be made.
  - 6. The owner of an animal to be leased must submit the Certificate of Registration for that animal and a completed Application for Transfer, with the "Lease" box marked, to Holstein Association USA, Inc. All lease applications must be received by July 15 in the year exhibiting.
  - 7. The fee to lease an animal is \$20. There is no fee to record a lease termination.
  - 8. When a lease is initiated and approved, the Certificate of Registration will be printed with the lease details and mailed to the Junior lessee. When a lease is terminated and the Certificate of Registration is returned to Holstein Association USA, the lease termination will be recorded on the certificate and the certificate will be mailed to the owner. All leases expire on December 31 of the year in which the junior lessee becomes 21 years of age if not terminated prior to that date.
- E) Exhibition: To be eligible to compete at National Shows, entries must be shown by the Junior owner in all cases, except by prior written approval. Alternate Leadsperson forms must be submitted to the Holstein representative by 5 p.m., Central time, the day before the show. If approved, another National Junior Holstein member the same birth year or younger must show the animal. Adults are not allowed to show, in any case. A leased animal may only be shown by the Junior lessee. If a junior needs help with an animal in the ring that has gotten out of control, it is up to the discretion of show staff and/or Holstein Association USA representatives to determine junior eligibility in the ring. Safety is of most importance to any situation, however, if the junior is not at the halter for a significant period of time, junior recognition may be removed.
- F) Bred & Owned: To be eligible for Junior Bred & Owned, at least one of the Junior owners must be listed as a breeder and owner on the registration certificate. Bred & Owned class winner medallions and Champion awards are presented by Holstein Association USA, Inc.
- G) Partnership: More than one Junior exhibitor may own an animal in partnership if the animal is exhibited by the partnership throughout the entire show season and the names of all Junior partners are listed on the registration certificate. A junior under age 9 by date of the show may be listed on the registration certificate but cannot show the animal. Adult-Junior and family or farm partnerships are not acceptable.
- **H) Violations:** If any of the above Junior Showring Policy is violated, all Junior exhibitors involved will lose all privileges for that show the following year.

- 4. A contestant must use the same animal in the finals as he/she used in earlier heat(s).
- Milking females do not need to be "bagged" for competition. Extra credit will not be given for those who are bagged.
- 6. The judges may ask questions about breed(s), showing and fitting and the general dairy industry.
- 7. The PDCA Showmanship Evaluation Card will be used for the judging of the showmanship contest.
- 8. Decisions of the judges and contest superintendents are final.
- 9. Parents are to adhere to the Showring Code of Ethics and to practice good sportsmanship at all times.
- 10. Past winners may participate again in the Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Divisions. Whereas, previous Division winners are not eligible for cash awards presented within the same previous participating Division.
- 11. Heats will be approximately 30 minutes in length.
- 12. A number of showmen will be selected, at the judge's discretion from each heat, to participate in the finals. The finals will be held immediately following the last heat for that Division.
- 13. All exhibitors will be given entry numbers and are required to wear these in show harnesses during the competition. Heats will be posted at the Milkhouse, on the WDE website and emailed to all registered participants. Back tags may be picked up Friday, September 26 at 6 p.m. in the Sale Pavilion or on Saturday, September 27 from 8-11 a.m. in The Tanbark (Arena Building). Back tags will then move to the Coliseum north cattle show entrance.
- 14. Required attire for the contest is white pants and either a white shirt or an official 2025 World Dairy Expo Junior Show shirt.
- 15. Following the conclusion of the senior division, the first and second place winners of each division will return to the showring to compete for the Annette Ostrom Memorial Supreme Showman Award. This class will function as a new class; previous placings will not be taken into consideration. All three division judges will evaluate the participants.

- Participants enrolled in the National Judging Contest shall meet at the Ultrasound Tent at the Coliseum north cattle show entrance at 8:15 a.m. and will be escorted to the Sale Pavilion.
- 4. Contestants must provide a show halter.
- 5. All exhibitors will be given backtags and are required to wear these in show harnesses during the competition. <u>Backtags may be picked up Friday, September 26 at 6 p.m. in the Sale Pavilion or on Saturday, September 27 from 8-9 a.m. in the Sale Pavilion</u>.
- 6. Shirts and garments with farm names, sale names or agricultural logos are prohibited.
- 7. Contestants must provide an animal to fit. Contestants need not own the animal they fit. Contestants are responsible for obtaining permission from the owner, if the animal is not his/her own. The animal must be entered in a World Dairy Expo show or sale.
- 8. Only the head/neck and legs of the heifer may be clipped before the contest. See diagram below.
- O. Contestant set-up begins at 8:30 a.m. Saturday in the Sale Pavilion.
- Contestants must provide their own fitting equipment. Fitting chutes and personal assistants are not permitted for the Contest.
- 11. Contestants will have 60 minutes to fit their animal to show ready.
- 12. After the completion of fitting, at the Judges discretion, division contestants may be asked to lead out their animal. The Judge will perform a final fitting inspection of all contestants and present placings and reasons. Finalists shall remain in the Sale Pavilion for pictures.
- 13. Awards will be presented at the conclusion of the Contest.




